There are people who are most careful about keeping themselves and their clothes clean. They would not use a cup, or a spoon, or a towel used by someone else. Yet they do not mind breathing into their lungs, over and over again, the cast-off air from the lungs of others.

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Some people like to sleep in the open air, and this is very healthy. Do you know any boy who sleeps in a room with the windows closed?
